

I look forward to seeing your return in September where we will strive for even more success with our advocacy, celebrations and projects through December 2023.



Did you Know? by Sheila Louder

Earth Day (April 22-Annually) was the brainchild of Senator Gaylord Nelson of Wisconsin, a staunch environmentalist who hoped to provide unity to the grassroots environmental movement and increase ecological awareness.

Along with Denis Hayes, a Harvard grad student organized the first Earth Day in 1970. Legislation by Nelson in Congress to protect the Appalachian Trail organized the first Earth Day.

Because of Earth Day in the early 1970's the most important environmental legislation in the U.S. was passed "The Clean Air" and "The Clean Water" acts. Many important environmental events have happened since 1970 and Earth Day's kickoff "The Paris Agreement".

What ACTION can you take to support this important issue?

- Take part in the great global cleanup: push to end plastic pollution and use.
- Purchase sustainable clothing so cut down on greenhouse gas emission in landfills
- Make an Earth Day yard sign stating "Let's Help Save the Environment
- Make your next meal plant based. Shifting to a plant based diet and avoiding animal products relieves our planet of the burdens of animal agriculture, a huge contributor to ecological destruction.
- Plan or participate in a community clean up removing plastic and trash from the areas and lakes and waterways.
- Send a letter to your elected officials stating fossil fuel is devastating the environment asking them to Invest in our planet by supporting the Earth Bill that will help the U.S. adhere to the Commitments of the Paris Agreement and transition to renewable energy by 2030.
- \*The Paris Agreement is a legally binding international treaty on climate change. It was adopted by 196 parties at the UN Climate Change Conference (COP21) in Paris, France, on 12 December 2015. It entered into force on 4 November 2014. The Paris Agreement works on a 5 year cycle of increasingly ambitious climate action by signers of the Agreement to reduce their greenhouse gas emissions.



















### CSW67 by Sheila Louder

On March 6-17, 2023 I joined 15,000 women and a few men who attended CSW67 out of New York City. Seven thousand (7000) attended The Commission in person while 8,000 joined the forum virtually. As part of the Church Women United delegation and Ecumenical Women I had the opportunity to participate in the drafting of our NGO Agreed Conclusion written prior to the opening of the forum.

As a result of Agreed Conclusions being reached, I will summarize affirmations on the forum theme "Innovation and technological change, and education in the digital age for achieving gender equality and the empowerment of all woman and girls".

World Conference on Women (Beijing, 4-15 September 1995) the outcome documents of the twenty-third special session of the General Assembly and the declarations adopted by the Commission on the occasion of the tenth, fifteenth, twentieth and twenty-fifth anniversaries of the Fourth World Conference on Women, and stresses the need to further strengthen their implementation.

(1) The Commission on the Status of Women reaffirms the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action, Fourth

- (2) The Commission reiterates that the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW), the Convention on the Rights of the Child, the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities and the International Convention on the Protection of the Rights of All Migrant Workers and Members of Their Families, provide an international legal framework and a comprehensive set of measures for realizing gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls and the full and equal enjoyment of all human rights and fundamental freedoms by all women and girls, throughout their life course.
- (3) The Commission expresses concern that the economic and social fallout of the COVID-19 pandemic has compounded the impacts of the global food security crisis, climate change, environmental degradation and disasters, and has pushed women further behind and into extreme poverty, exacerbated pre-existing debt vulnerabilities, with many developing countries at high risk of or already in debt distress, magnified the unequal pace of digital transformation within and among countries and shown how these factors, when combined with structural and systemic barriers, can translate into unequal opportunities for women and girls, since the poorest and the most vulnerable, who are the hardest hit, are also those who lag behind the most in access to information and communications technologies. It expresses deep concern over the increased
- and gender-based violence. (4) The Commission notes with grave concern that about a third of the world's population, mainly in developing countries, especially women and girls and people in vulnerable situations, as well as two thirds of

demand for unpaid care and domestic work and the reported surge in all forms of violence, including sexual

- women in the least developed countries, DO NOT have access to the internet.

  (5) Support the important role of civil society actors in promoting and protecting the human rights and fundamental freedoms of all women: take steps to protect such actors, including women human rights
- of human rights and to prevent discrimination, violations and abuses against them, such as threats, harassment, violence and reprisals; and combat impunity by taking steps to ensure that violations or abuses are promptly and impartially investigated and that those responsible are held accountable.

defenders; integrate a gender perspective into the creation of a safe and enabling environment for the defense

- (6) Condemn and take appropriate measures, including legal action, to combat the use of digital tools,
- including social media and online platforms, for the purpose of harassment, hate speech and racism against women and girls, trafficking in persons and all forms of sexual exploitation and abuse of women and girls, as
- well as for child, early and forced marriage and forced labour, and any non-consensual sharing of personal,

- (6) Condemn and take appropriate measures, including legal action, to combat the use of digital tools, including social media and online platforms, for the purpose of harassment, hate speech and racism against women and girls, trafficking in persons and all forms of sexual exploitation and abuse of women and girls, as well as for child, early and forced marriage and forced labour, and any non-consensual sharing of personal, sexually explicit content of women and the production and distribution of child pornography, also known as child sexual exploitation and abuse material.
- (7) The Commission affirms that women be included at the table and included in discussions where policy making and strategies are developed.
- (8) The Commission further recalls the Declaration on the Right to Development, the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples and the New York Declaration for Refugees and Migrants. (9) The Commission reiterates that the 2030 Agenda needs to be implemented in a comprehensive manner, reflecting its universal, integrated and indivisible nature, taking into account different national realities, capacities and levels of development, and respecting each country's policy space and leadership while remaining consistent with relevant international rules and commitments, including by developing cohesive sustainable development strategies to achieve gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls. The Commission affirms that Governments have the primary responsibility for the follow-up to and review of the 2030 Agenda at the national, regional and global levels with regard to progress made.
- (10) The Commission recognizes that adolescent girls are part of the most digitally connected generation in history and can disproportionately face discrimination, violence that occurs through or is amplified by the use of technology, and other barriers in the context of innovation and technological change, and education in the digital age, which prevents them from accessing the full benefits of digital technologies and meaningful participation in society, and can create and exacerbate inequalities.
- (11) The Commission calls upon the United Nations system entities, within their respective mandates, and other relevant international financial institutions and multi-stake holder platforms to support Member States, upon their request, in their efforts to achieve gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls in the context of innovation and technological change, and education in the digital age.

#### AND

The Commission calls upon the United Nations Entity for Gender Equality and the Empowerment of Women (UN-Women) to continue to play a central role in promoting gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls and in supporting Governments and national gender equality mechanisms, upon their request, in coordinating the United Nations system and in mobilizing civil society, the private sector, employers' organizations and trade unions, and other relevant stakeholders, at all levels, in support of the full, effective and accelerated implementation of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action and the gender-responsive implementation of the 2030 Agenda towards achieving gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls in the context of innovation and technological change, and education in the digital age.

### Fatherhood ... One of God's Ultimate Creations!

It's always intriguing to know the history of our various national holiday observances with "Father's Day" being one of them. Our traditional "Father's Day" in America is a holiday honoring one's father, grandfather or relevant father figure, as well as fatherhood, paternal bonds, and the influence of fathers in society. Across our nation, it is annually observed on the third Sunday of June. Credit for originating the holiday is generally given to Sonora Smart Dodd of Spokane, Washington in 1910. Her father is said to have been a Civil War veteran who raised her and her five siblings after their mother died in childbirth. Today it is held on various dates across the world with different regions maintaining their own traditions of honoring fatherhood.

One of the most significant roles in society, both past and present, is that of being a father. The foundational role of fatherhood in the family structure is pivotal to the overall wellbeing of our children. It has been statistically proven that children raised in homes with good fathers or father figures produce emotionally stable, productive adults. Many of us are familiar with the statement, "As the family goes, so goes the world." We look to fathers for guidance, wisdom, affirmation, love, discipline and security just to name a few of the aspects of this crucial role in life and family as we know it. You need not look far to experience the impacts of fathers and father figures in today's society ... positive or negative!



CWU sisters, family, and friends are encouraged to stand in solidarity of the many individuals impacted by gender violence.

In every country, gender-based violence is a tragic reality. This violence is frequently hidden, and victims are often silent, fearing stigma and further violence.

Thursdays in Black grew out of the World Council of Churches' (WCC) Decade of Churches in Solidarity with Women (1988-1998) campaign in which the stories of rape as a weapon of war, gender injustice, abuse, and violence became all the more visible. This global ecumenical campaign has been adopted by many of the WCC's member churches, national councils and ecumenical partners, inter-religious partners, student associations, and more.

The color black is often associated with negative racial connotations. In the Thursdays in Black campaign, the color black is used as a color of resistance and resilience.

The campaign is simple but profound. WEAR BLACK ON THURSDAYS. Wear a pin to declare that you are part of the global movement resisting attitudes and practices that permit rape and violence. Show your respect for women who are resilient in the face of injustice and violence.

Encourage others to join you. Share your Thursdays in Black photos on Twitter, Facebook, and Instagram. Use the hashtags #ThursdaysinBlack and #WCC. Post the Thursdays in Black logo image in local CWU unit newsletters and electronic communications.

CWU sisters are also encouraged to send Thursdays in Black photos to Rev. Jameka Redmon Matthews, jamekaroshaun@gmail.com, who will post them to the National CWU Facebook page.

We all have a responsibility to speak out against violence, to ensure that women and men, boys, and girls are safe from rape and violence in homes, school, work, streets--in all places in our societies. Wear black on Thursdays in Black campaign.

### **VALIANT WOMAN - DR. ANGELA HARRINGTON RICE**

Rev. Angela Harrington Rice has been a longtime member of the Atlanta Unit and served 4 years until 2022 as CWU Atlanta Unit Ecumenical Celebration Chair. In this capacity, she skillfully planned and executed the 4 celebrations of the Unit. Because of her creativity with planning the celebrations many new members joined the Atlanta Unit.

Reverend Rice was instrumental with having the Unit highlighted on AIB TV which gave visibility to the community of the witness and service of the movement. She has brought Reflections at meetings and have served as Mistress of Ceremony at the CWU Georgia Annual "Women of the Year Celebration in 2016 and 2018. She is the Executive Director of Interfaith Community Initiatives where she provides guidance and leadership for its'

World Pilgrims and Immersion programs. Through this organization, she has traveled with Jews, Christians, and Muslims to countries around the world.

For over twenty-five (25) years, Angela led a distinguished career in television broadcasting in the Atlanta region. During her career, she developed and produced award-winning television series such as Spiritual Journey, a program that explored the spiritual lives of faith leaders in Atlanta and A Women's Place, a series that addressed the concerns of women. For her work that focused on interfaith relationships, she was awarded a regional Emmy Award for World Pilgrims: A Sacred Journey to Turkey. In 2013, Angela was inducted into the National Association of Television Arts and Sciences (NATAS) Silver Circle, an honor that recognizes individuals in broadcast media who have exhibited exemplary service to the industry.

Rev. Angela Harrington Rice is the author of Resurrecting the Lives of Liberated Women, a collection of vignettes about inspiring women and in contributor of the anthology Shaking Off the Dust: Personal Narratives of Triumph.

She encourages and invites members from the community to come together to learn about and promote advocacy about gender equality of women and girls in other countries. She brings together

the ecumenical community for prayer and worship as well as addresses justice and peace concerns.

Karen is a Ruling Elder in the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. at Covenant presbyterian Church, Atlanta, Georgia. In the Presbytery of Greater Atlanta, she serves on the Georgia Legislative Session annually to address bills and policies that affects the lives of Georgian citizens.

Karen serves on the Presbyterian Women Coordinating Team (PWCT) as the historian and liaison for AMIS, an organization that assists foreign students who attend college in the United States make a smooth transition to American life and culture. International Students who cannot go home for Thanksgiving and Christmas are hosted in homes for the holidays. 

### EXPANDING THE HORIZONS OF CWU—ONE PERSON AT A TIME

As the History Committee works with sorting out and preserving the records of the Atlanta Unit of Church Women United, we are finding some interesting history. One such piece is an acceptance speech made after the installation of the president of the Atlanta Unit at the Annual Meeting, June 1977. A portion of that speech is shared with today's readers:

Frances Kennedy (Mrs. William B.) wrote the following in 1977:

As I read the world we are living in - positive and cooperative global living is no longer an option. Our local imperatives have been clearly presented to us today in the previous reports. I would add a broader concern. "The Stockholm International Peace Research Institute has just reported that about thirty-five countries will be able to make the first atomic weapons within nine years and that nuclear war will become inevitable."

The issue of world peace and our response to it through our faith in Jesus Christ as Lord was one of the first ways in which I became involved with Church Women United in Atlanta, when we returned to the United States last year. We worked together on a people's platform for a global society. This unit's creed, "Agreed to Differ, Resolved to Love and United to Serve" is a wholistic expression derived from our view of the interrelationship of all aspects of life: human dignity, adequate means of livelihood, health, education and cultural opportunity, personal aspirations, religious freedom and growth, sound environment, participation is decisions affecting our interdependence between what happens in the local community and what is happening in other sections of the country and in other parts of the world. 'Every land is a mission field and every Christian is a missionary' and yet, "culture is persuading us in a hundred different ways that everything human is useless and that we can only hope to get lost by narrowing our consciousness and coping with that little bit of life that is allowed us and to stay where we are with that." But to be a Christian is to have a renewed hope in people and to be an advocate for God in keeping alive that hope in one another, that hope in the silent majority, that hope in people who work around us every day.

Frances Kennedy was born in Columbus Georgia, grew up in Macon, Georgia and attended Queens College, and as she lived in different communities, she became involved in various ministries along with her Presbyterian pastor spouse, from Virginia, Charlotte, New Haven, South Carolina, Atlanta, Switzerland, etc. When her spouse accepted a position with the World Council of Churches in 1969, the family moved to Geneval Switzerland, where they remained until early 1976. There she interacted with persons from all over the world. When they returned to the states to Atlanta, Georgia, Will took a position as director of the Atlanta Action for International Education. During her Atlanta sojourn, Frances became involved with Church Women United, and became its president in June 1977. In 1979, Will, a Presbyterian minister, accepted a teaching position at Union Seminary in New York City. Both became active at the historic Riverside Church, New York City, and Frances continued her work with national Church Women United. She served in several national leadership positions as she used her skills developed from global encounters. She even traveled by Trailways Bus at her expense (national body could not cover the expense) to a CWU event in California on one occasion when the bus

broke down in Texas. Travel was no better on her return as she met up with her spouse in Denver as he drove the family car. This information was shared by family members at her memorial service. At the Riverside Church, she was part of the Search Committee that brought the name of Jim Forbes, a prominent African American to serve as senior pastor. When the family retired to Montreat, North Carolina, Frances served as a ruling elder in the Black Mountain Presbyterian Church. It was Jim Forbes, now living in North Carolina, who would deliver the eulogy at her memorial service. He told about her "radical wave of hopsitality" as a "good, white woman" as told though his stories, poems, and songs to illustrate how she tried to "repair the damage of diminished humanity" through her life and work, using the biblical story of Dorcas (Acts 9: 36...). At the service, members of her family read from her notes about her witness and service over the years.

One of her associates, Emily, wrote the following on her obituary page: "We got arrested together in Washington, DC, in front of the South African Embassy with about 50 members and pastors of Riverside Church. It's what we had to do to fight apartheid. She waltzed into the office of the CEO of Chase Bank, with her sweet voice and southern charm and explained that she would have every member congregation of Church Women United and the National Council of Churches move their portfolio of retirement saving out of Chase holdings if they didn't divest from South Africa. She was a fierce and determined warrior for justice."

--Bettie J. Durrah, who knew Frances Kennedy briefly when she was active in the Atlanta group, followed her encounters with the ecumenical and global church. Frances Kennedy died August 21, 2022. Her memorial service was held November 19, 2022.


